# **Shaping our future**

You may already know that NCBA has undergone many significant changes in the last year. This has resulted in a new Board of Trustees, a new **Operations Manager (Sandra** Donkin) and several new staff. One thing that hasn't changed however, is our dedication to supporting those that are visually impaired and our team of enthusiastic volunteers who are an inspiration to us all. We continue to be supported by the Big Lottery fund, by small grants and the fundraising efforts of our volunteers and the wider community; and

of course, we have the excellent resource that is our Morpeth drop-in centre.

We are fortunate to have this strong foundation to build on; however, over the coming year we face some challenges; the largest of which is the lottery fund which will reach the end of its term. After extensive consideration of the options and in order to position ourselves for the future, the Trustees have identified several areas for future development. Trustees and management would like to present their initial ideas to the volunteers, service users and their families, and would appreciate your feedback.

Our current thinking is summarised below:

- 1. NCBA will continue to provide all the services that we currently offer and intend to expand the offering to include rehab services and to enhance the outreach support across the region.
- 2. NCBA are investigating whether to also offer services to support people with hearing loss. We already have a great partnership with 'Action on Hearing Loss' and are looking to expand this collaboration.
- 3. Building on our knowledge of welfare rights and employment issues we are looking to obtain funding to support people with a sensory impairment to

access benefits they may be entitled to and to assist working age people enter the employment market, or maintain their current role when diagnosed with a sensory impairment.

4. In order to reflect the increase in the scope of services we provide, NCBA would need to undergo a name (and logo) change. One name that has been proposed is the 'Northumberland Sensory Association' (supported by the strapline 'for the visually and hearing impaired'). Our newsletter, the NOISE, will also undergo rebranding and we would like your suggestions on a new name.

We want to bring you all with us on our journey, and would very much like to hear your views and ideas relating to the wider service offering, the name change, and any other ways that we can better provide support to people in Northumberland living with sensory loss. # My 10 Years at NCBA by Ruth Speirs, Finance Officer

December 10<sup>th</sup> 2017 saw the anniversary of my 10 years here at NCBA. The day I started was the staff Xmas outing and as I sat listening to bad jokes, anecdotes and Xmas stories with a silly hat, gifts, cards, crackers, and party poppers, I knew I'd met a great bunch of people and I'd never felt so welcome in my life.

After a business degree at Northumbria, I'd hopped from various sales & marketing roles to customer service & finance – mostly in the private sector but it was always my dream to work for a charity.

I'd volunteered for Oxfam throughout my studies and going to work for a pay check alone was never enough for me. I needed to feel more useful and more fulfilled – I knew there was better out there and I found it in NCBA.

The charity sector was a breath of fresh air to me – yes, the work was perhaps less secure as you were always relying on the next funding bid to keep going but the people were warm and welcoming and supportive and had a deep passion for those they were trying to help. They had charity at their heart and it radiated through everything they did.

I loved my role - I was learning new skills, discovering new technology and felt at ease in a function that suited my personality and approach to a task. It was varied – one day I'd be flicking between spreadsheets behind a desk, scratching my head trying to balance the figures and the next, on an activities outing or running a chocolate tombola at one of the fayres. Over time I would get to know more of the clients and gain an understanding of some of the daily challenges they would face. It gave me perspective and a new found sense of respect for the people that manage to go about their daily lives with this challenging and multifaceted condition.

Of course it wasn't all sunshine and lollipops. We had the (great) flood of 2008 that destroyed 95% of the contents of Reiver House, led to a fire that burned part of the roof and saw us temporarily located at Ashington Business Park for 10 months. Various staff & trustees came and went but the loss of the Rehabilitation contract in 2014 was perhaps the most upsetting. The core NCBA team was split and the confusion, worry and dismay from our loyal clients was palpable. With no manager at the helm, myself and Nicola along with 3 new recruits and a handful of trustees that had stuck with us through thick and

thin, vowed to keep the engine running until we could recover, stabilise and get back on track.

In amongst all this I lost both parents and had 2 more children – both of whom – like the first, made it their mission to keep me up all hours of the night! So I've had 10 years of ups and downs but coming into work surrounded by people who care about others, who are selfless, unwavering in their support and dedicated to the cause has been my stability and my saviour.

NCBA is a special place and it's special because of the people. Working here has given me a sense of fulfilment, purpose and enjoyment, that -I'm willing to bet - most people can only dream of. I actually look forward to coming to work on a Monday morning - how many people can say that?

# One to one IT Training by Jenny Stewart, IT Consultant

Technology has come a long way in being able to help people who are visually impaired; so much so that with the right bit of software, people are able to regain their independence and let the technology assist them.

I run my own IT consultancy business in the Tyne Valley (JennySys Computing Services: www.jennysys.co.uk) and have been in IT since 1985. I have been training visually impaired people at NCBA for nearly 3 years. The program that I use is called Guide (produced by Dolphin).

This is a really nice piece of software that keeps the user safely within the program. It is an important bit of information to get across as one of the main worries people have (visually impaired or not) is "can I accidentally damage or mess up the computer?" With Guide, users are given a menu driven system where they can create letters, documents, write emails and browse the web. However, one of the really good bits of Guide is the ability to scan and read documents.


Now this is where, visually impaired people can get a bit of their independence back, rather than ask a friend or neighbour to read their mail (some of which may well be personal). Guide can scan the document and read it back to you. I can remember very well when I was training someone on Guide. They asked me to setup their newly purchased scanner / printer that they had delivered to their house. On arrival, there were 2 letters on the door mat. My student said "great we can use these as a try of my new scanner / printer". I knew what the letters were about, but they didn't. So I duly set up the

printer and sat them down. When Guide scanned the letter in and read back "Premium Bonds Awards notice" my student was delighted!

Independence is a word that I keep hearing when I'm training my students. Some have just recently lost their sight and are unhappy at having to ask for help for things that they had never had to in the past. Here, Guide can give a little independence back allowing the user to fully participate in the information and technology changes that are taking place.

Age is not a barrier to learning either. My oldest client was 93 and she was amazing. In fact, they have all been amazing. A lot of my students have said that they wanted a new challenge in their lives and Guide has been that.


The vast majority of my students have never really used a computer before and never used a keyboard, so one of my first tasks is to get the student familiar with the layout of the keyboard. The idea is that the fingers become the "eyes" for the student. If your fingers can get to all letters on the keyboard, then they can do everything that a sighted person can do with a computer.

I train people on a 1:1 basis. I initially trained in small groups but found that this just simply wasn't possible with people with varying degrees of sight loss and varying knowledge of computers.

So now, it's just you and me and I make it very tailored to what you want to learn and we go at your speed and no-one else's. I have really enjoyed training people and it is a joy to see people's initial reticence change into confidence.
