


Bamburgh Castle Abseil – quotes from those who took part!

At NCBA our Home Visiting Service supports people with a visual impairment to maintain their independence and to continue to live in their own home.

Our trained volunteers assist with tasks including accessing information, reading correspondence and, where appropriate, helping the person respond, accompanying them on a walk. They can also assist with shopping, organising groceries and checking "use by" dates, helping with a hobby, or just having a cuppa and a chat.

One service user said: "I look forward to my volunteer visiting me and enjoy talking about current news affairs and voicing our opinions. I listen to the news more closely now so I have plenty to say for future discussions."

Our volunteers also get a lot from their role. David, who has been volunteering for a number of months, said: "I enjoy my volunteer work for NCBA. As a home visitor to someone who is quite isolated living in rural Northumberland, it's very rewarding to know that my visits mean so much. It has also boosted my self-confidence meeting new people who value my visits."

All of our volunteers working with clients are trained in sighted guide technique and how best to support someone with a vision impairment. They are also vetted by the Disclosure and Barring Service - previously CRB.

Clubs and support groups are set up throughout Northumberland to combat social isolation felt by many vision-impaired people as a result of sight loss.

Anyone with sight loss can join a club or support group, whether registered or not. Carers, friends and relatives are also welcome to attend. The aim of the groups is to provide vision-impaired people with support to enable them to meet with other partially-sighted people from their own community.

The groups are supported by volunteers and are self-funding and self-motivating, enabling members to maintain independence, choice and control.

Bringing services together to support people with a visual impairment in Northumberland

We held another successful Information Day in September, bringing together suppliers of low vision aids and sight loss organisations, providing information and advice about services and support. The event was well attended giving local people the opportunity to speak with representatives about their services and low vision products.

People took the opportunity to try out some of the latest products and technologies including the latest electronic video magnifiers and magnification software. We look forward to holding a similar event in the Spring at Reiver House.

The CEA Card is a national card scheme developed for UK cinemas by the UK Cinema Association (UKCA). The scheme was introduced in 2004 and is one of the ways for participating cinemas to ensure they make reasonable adjustments for disabled guests when they go to the cinema; in particular it ensures a complimentary ticket for someone to go with them.

Accessible Screenings for visually impaired people -

Audio Description (AD): this provides a prerecorded voice commentary that describes features such as action, body language, expressions and movements. Because it fits within the silent gaps in a film, it doesn't interfere with the dialogue. The audio commentary is listened to via a headset which can be borrowed from the cinema - iust ask a member of staff. For more information about participating cinemas go to:

Northumberland Low Vision Action Group Success

Trying to improve accessibility and make the streets safer for blind and partially sighted people can be a slow process, however, the Northumberland Low Vision Action Group (NAG) can report on a success.

If you are a Guide Dog user or use a long cane, you may have noticed that the tactile paving in Morpeth shopping Arcade (Sanderson Arcade) had the wrong tactile paving leading to the steps and crossings. In case you are not aware of the different types of tactile paving, the corduroy type (that is the long parallel ridges) is to indicate steps leading up or down. The blister paving (raised dots) is to indicate a crossing.

NAG raised the issue with the management of the Arcade and with the help of Northumberland County Council, the owners of the Arcade have now replaced the incorrect paving.

It is yet another example of why planners should communicate with the blind community before they embark on any type of building work that could affect the visually impaired - (reproduced with kind permission)
