RNIB's Online Today project is helping people with sensory loss get online

A free online basic skills session is being held at Reiver House, Morpeth on **Wednesday 8 February 2017, 10am – 3.30pm** to help blind and partially sighted people get online and take their first steps in using technology.

The session will be handson, including interactive demonstrations of how to get the most from products such as **tablets**, **iPads**, **smartphones** and **eReaders**.

Supported by the Big Lottery Fund, RNIB's Online Today project aims to help 125,000 people living with sensory loss to get online, enabling them to use the internet for everyday tasks such as shopping, banking and staying in touch with friends and family.

David Brown from Action for Blind People said: "Access to the internet and technology can open up a whole new world for people, but knowing where to start isn't always easy



if you have sight or hearing problems. Our Online Today sessions are the perfect introduction, providing the basic skills and confidence to get online and explore all that is on offer.

Research suggests Iluvien can improve vision for patients with chronic diabetic macular oedema

New research suggests patients who receive a single implant to treat diabetic eye disease can increase or sustain vision. The data from real-life clinical practice was revealed earlier this year at the Royal College of Ophthalmologists Annual Congress.

Results showed that the majority of chronic diabetic macular oedema (cDMO) patients who received a single Iluvien implant, administered into the vitreous cavity at the front of the eye by injection during routine clinical practice, gained or maintained vision at 12 months. The implant provides a therapeutic effect for up to 36 months.

DMO is an inflammatory disease affecting the macula, the part of the retina responsible for central vision. The disease is the primary cause of vision loss associated with diabetic retinopathy, which in turn is the most common cause of severe sight impairment among people of working age.

In England, Iluvien is recommended by NICE as a

possible treatment for people with chronic DMO who have an artificial lens in their eye if:

- the implant is used in the eye with the artificial lens and
- their DMO has not improved with available treatments.

Mr David Steel who is a consultant ophthalmologist at the Sunderland Eye Infirmary commented that: "Anti VEGF injections have been a major advance in the treatment of DMO but not all patients respond to this treatment. Diabetic patients with chronic macular oedema in particular are frequently unresponsive but studies show Iluvien can often work in this situation. Furthermore because of Iluvien's long duration of action repeated monthly injections are not needed which is significant bonus."

The real world data was obtained from two sources: a European registry study and an audit of UK clinical practice. The Iluvien Registry Safety Study (IRISS) is a safety study that Iluvien's manufacturer Alimera Sciences is required to perform.

Professor Usha Chakravarthy from Queen's University Belfast, principal investigator of the IRISS study, said: "In these real world studies, patients were switched to Iluvien when clinicians had determined that despite other treatments there was vision decline and worsening appearance of the macula.

"Following the switch there were improvements in visual acuity and retinal morphology in the majority of patients showing that Iluvien is an important addition to our therapeutic armamentarium."

Inspire and support visually impaired young people by becoming a LOOK UK mentor!

Young people with a vision impairment can face barriers to achieving their potential, and it can be difficult to make informed decisions and manage transitions. That's why LOOK UK is connecting these young people with volunteer mentors; inspiring role models who can help them to understand their options, develop their skills and ultimately build a bright future.

They are working with the national online mentoring charity Brightside to support visually impaired young people with education, careers and future thinking, and they are looking for mentors with experience and knowledge of visual impairment to take part in this project from November 2016.

As an online mentor, you will help young people develop the knowledge and connections required to be able to make confident and informed decisions about their next steps - whether that is deciding their future career path, going into higher education or seeking volunteering or community work. The project also involves face-to-face training and events, designed to help you build rapport with your mentees, develop your mentoring skills and celebrate your mentoring relationship.

How online mentoring works. You will be matched with a mentee aged 16 – 25 who is at or approaching a time of transition. You will communicate with them at least once per fortnight (approx. 2-3 hours per month). You will be using a safe and secure online mentoring platform where you can exchange messages and share resources and information.

Volunteer profiles

Volunteering with NCBA does make such a difference to many people with a visual impairment living in Northumberland.

Alan is 105 years old, partially deaf and severely sight impaired. He cannot get out and about, so life can be very lonely at times. Liz visits Alan on a regular basis and as Alan says: "It's great when Liz visits me, she is always cheerful and we get on just grand. Liz and I chat about all kinds of things. I like to go down memory lane and hear what she has been up to. Sometimes she even brings her 'gadget' and we can listen to my favourite brass band music."

Liz says: "As an Optician, I frequently see how visual impairment can impact on peoples' lives. Sight loss can be a lonely and scary place – something I realised when a member of my family suffered a sudden loss of vision several years ago. I decided to get involved with the NCBA, hoping that

perhaps my experience could be used to help others. In actual fact, I feel I am the one who has benefitted most by working with NCBA! I have learnt a lot about working with visually impaired people, and I think I have a better understanding of the difficulties they have coping with day-to-day activities and the things those of us without visual problems take for granted.

When my husband took part in the NCBA abseil fundraising event at Bamburgh Castle in August, I was totally overwhelmed by the courage and spirit shown by those people with sight loss who launched themselves off the top of that 60 foot tower – talk about a leap of faith!

I really enjoy visiting Alan – he is such a character, he always cheers me up! I love hearing him talk about growing up on the farm in Allendale, being signed up and training as an engineer with the RAF, his travels

with the brass band and the antics of his youth. It's great when we talk about how things have changed over the years and hearing how he would put the world to right.

For all of his sensory and health problems, Alan never complains. He always comments how other people are so much worse off than he is – he certainly helps me keep things in perspective!"

Karen has been volunteering with NCBA for a number of years in a variety of roles. Karen says: "Volunteering with NCBA is really rewarding. I found out about NCBA through a couple of clients I was visiting as part of the housebound library service. My first major role was helping to introduce interested people to the internet and email using specialist software for the blind. Working with clients one to one every Monday morning was really good and I enjoyed sharing my knowledge and opening up

new opportunities to people. This work led to visiting a client to take him shopping as he was no longer able to drive.

I travelled with the then Volunteer Coordinator to Blyth to visit an elderly gentleman, **Eddie**, who was then 92 years old. We arrived on a very snowy day in December and that was the beginning of what has turned out to be a mutually rewarding relationship.

We started shopping on a fortnightly basis and very quickly, Eddie wanted me to visit him on a weekly basis. I have now been going to Blyth every Monday for four years and the role has grown to include lots of different activities to assist Eddie and help him maintain his independence. I have also learned many new skills through this role, including how to maintain hearing aids, how different aids can help overcome difficulties due to sight loss and Eddie, as a keen ballroom dancer, has even managed to teach me

a few of his favourite dances. We were able to try out my dancing skills at a tea dance organised by NCBA.

I recently interviewed Eddie in connection with a deafblind project that he and I are connected to. He feels that if he didn't have the weekly visits it is likely he would no longer be able to remain in his own home. He dreads having to leave his home and move into a care home and the weekly support means this doesn't need to happen. It's very rewarding to know you make such a difference to someone's life".

All of our volunteers who support clients on a one to one basis are trained in sighted guide technique and how best to support someone with a visual impairment. They are also vetted by the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS).

Hours for most roles are flexible and out-of-pocket expenses, such as mileage, phone calls and parking fees will be reimbursed.

Half price TV Licence

If you are blind (severely sight impaired) and can provide the appropriate evidence, you are eligible to apply for a 50% concession on your TV licence. Your licence will also cover anyone who lives with you. If you are partially sighted (sight impaired) you are not eligible.

A blind concession TV Licence costs £72.75 for colour and £24.50 for a black and white TV Licence.

You need to provide a photocopy of one of the following documents, to confirm that you're certified as either **blind** or **severely sight impaired**:

 A copy of the certificate or document issued by or on behalf of your local authority. A copy of the certificate from your ophthalmologist

You won't need to provide this information again when you renew your TV License.

Include either your licence renewal notice or TV Licence number if you have a current TV Licence.

Key Communications update

We are now into year three of our Key Communicatins Project. In that time we have delivered on a number of the project's outcomes.



Outcome 1 - More blind and vision-impaired people will have increased choice and control, build confidence, and maintain their independence. We have established a number of outreach information clinics across the county giving people access to low vision aids, daily living aids and the opportunity to receive further information and advice.

Outcome 2 - More blind and vision-impaired people will feel socially included, experiencing increased opportunity and social activity. The continuation of the many clubs, support groups and other events giving people the chance to socilaise in a supportive environment.

Outcome 3 - More blind and vision-impaired people will cope better and more independently in day-to-day life as a result of gaining new communication and technological skills. This year we established computer training classes at Morpeth and Hexham, which has proved very popular. We have also worked in partnership with RNIB by holding introductory training sessions in the use of tablets, smartphones and ebook readers.

In addition to the above, we created a new website, set up new Twitter and Facebook social media sites and held two very successful supplier and equipment information days. We have held service user and volunteer feedback sessions and look forward to implementing some ideas gained from these meetings in our work in the New Year.


