Several years ago I agreed to do some voluntary driving for the NCBA. I have enjoyed this work very much, since it helped me to meet a lot of blind and partially sighted people, running back and forward from their homes to various clubs and meetings at Reiver House.

During the time I was doing this voluntary driving we had a serious storm and a good percentage of Morpeth was inundated with flood water from the River Wansbeck. The flooding included Reiver House and its grounds and gardens which surrounded the property. The garden and the grounds were almost destroyed and stood that way until I agreed to try and recover what I could. This was a job that was going to last me for years. I begged and borrowed all the plants and shrubs that I could. I even managed to obtain a ton or so of rock stone to try and improve the appearance of Reiver House. I also tried to produce as many summer bedding plants as I could

which of course provided a lot of colour during the summer. We also won a few awards when the "Northumbria in Bloom" awards were announced.

I didn't of course do all the work myself. I had help from our "Bloomers Garden Club" before they moved off to Hepscott. I also had quite a lot of help from some of the volunteers who were interested – in particular from the "Women's Group" who paid for the plants and shrubs in one of the beds in the "William Turner Garden". We also had help from the local police.

Now, due to health problems I am no longer able to look after the gardens.

I would like to say that the last twenty years of my retirement, looking after the grounds of Reiver House has given me lots of pleasure and satisfaction and afforded me the opportunity of meeting some of the nicest, most pleasant people I have met in my life.

## Croatian Sailing Adventure With Tactile and Talking Charts, by Dr Phil Anderson

I was delighted to be invited to join a group of three VIP and three sighted friends who had planned a two week sailing adventure on board a yacht around the Croatian coast and islands.

As an ex-Master Mariner I was tasked with undertaking

some pre-voyage passage planning which involved identifying some alternative routes we could take – which would be weather dependent – and plotting the possible courses on navigational charts. This exercise involves research using the relevant 'Pilot Book' which provides an

enormous amount of information and data about the coastline, islands, possible ports of call, anchorages and much more.

Whilst undertaking this prevoyage exercise it occurred to me that my VIP sailor friends had little opportunity to become involved in either the passage planning aspects or in the navigation once we joined the yacht - since the charts are visual representations of the coastlines and islands etc. and access to the content of the Pilot Book would be extremely difficult for someone without sight. This would, or so it appeared to me, put an unfair limit on the ability of the VIP sailors to participate fully in the adventure.

I therefore set about trying to source charts which a non-sighted person could use. Unfortunately I drew a complete blank. I discovered that whilst some previous attempts had been made to create tactile charts for some of the more popular sailing areas around the U.K. coast, these were few and far

between, difficult to obtain and there were no such charts for Croatia. Having set the idea in motion, I could not simply let it go. I decided a little lateral thinking was necessary and I started to consider whether I could create my own tactile charts.


The starting point was to obtain copies of the relevant passage planning charts: Imray charts M23 – Adriatic Sea, M25 – Otok Rab to Sibernik and M26 – Split to Dubrovnik. After trying a number of different products, I was led to the RNIB and a pen called 'Tacti-Mark' which contains a liquid which, when dry, forms a raised three dimensional coloured mark.

This provided an excellent solution. It was then a matter of finding quite a considerable amount of time, and patience, to draw around the coastline and islands on the charts with the 'Tacti-Mark'. Although somewhat laborious – it proved to be a most interesting and useful exercise for me to become very familiar with every bay, harbour and islands of Croatia!

Once I had completed that task – and had provided the prototype for feedback and approval to one of my VIP sailor friends – it occurred to me that a tactile chart alone, whilst a good step forward in the right direction, did have severe limitations in its usefulness. I needed to find a way to bring the charts alive and thus provide a much greater level of accessibility to relevant information by non-sighted crew.

Following further research I learned about a labelling device, available from the RNIB, called 'PENfriend' which was used to record information onto self-adhesive voice labels which could be attached to a wide range of items in and around the home, at school and at work. This sounded as though it could provide a solution to my problem. The device is however quite expensive and without any funding and without knowing whether it would actually provide the solution I was looking for - I was faced with something of a dilemma.

However, Mr Trevor Watson, the then Information and Voluntary Services Manager of the Northumberland County Blind Association (NCBA) came to our rescue and agreed to lend to me a 'PENfriend2'.

The instrument proved to be ideal. I could apply 'labels' to the charts in various strategic locations such that onto relevant labels, I could then dictate information from the charts themselves as well as the Imray 'Adriatic Pilot' - which included general detail about weather conditions which could be anticipated in the Adriatic, coastal passages, dangers and hazards to navigation as well as considerable detail about ports and anchorages we might visit during our adventure.

By running their finger tips along the raised 'Tacti-Mark' lines along the coast and islands and using the 'PENfriend2' instrument to touch the 'labels' and hear the audio recordings – the VIP sailors would, I hoped, have a new level of access to such an important aspect of the sailing adventure. The proof, however, was going to be in the pudding!

We joined yacht 'Tibitoo' in the Croatian port of Zadar on 29 April 2017. From there we sailed south towards Dubrovnik having stopped off at various harbours and anchorages along the way, arriving on the 3 May. Departing Dubrovnik on 5 May we started making our way north back towards Zadar via some wonderful islands and ports of call – arriving on 10 May. We had sailed a total distance of 391.9 nautical miles.

To my relief our three VIP sailors, all of whom were very experienced and members of the G.B. Blind Sailing squad – Sharon, Sally and Eddie – quickly picked up how to use the tactile / talking charts and were most complementary.

They enthusiastically provided helpful feedback confirming that they found the charts very useful particularly with regard to providing a new level of orientation. Sharon commented: "...it helps make sense of things..."

As with any prototype – there was certainly 'room for improvement' and my three colleagues provided some very helpful suggestions with regard to additional information they would have found useful, as well as making certain aspects a little more user-friendly.

On the whole, however, I appear to have achieved my goal of enabling my VIP friends to more actively participate in a

range of navigational and passage planning activities which had previously been denied to them.

On behalf of myself and the whole crew of yacht 'Tibitoo' I would like to express our

sincere thanks to NCBA for their kindness in loaning to us the 'PENfriend2' labeller – which proved so very helpful and was very much appreciated.

Our community based confidence building courses provide information, advice, support and practical solutions to enable people diagnosed with sight loss maintain their independence.

We understand adapting to sight loss isn't easy. We know it's different for everyone, but whatever your experience we're here for you. If you or someone you know has been diagnosed with sight loss come along to one of our confidence building courses.

#### Why attend?

We recognise how important it is for people diagnosed with an eye condition to get practical help and advice, but also learn from others in similar situations. Wherever possible, we invite local people who are blind or partially sighted to run parts of

the course, provide and share knowledge based on their personal experiences.
The course also provides a chance to meet people who are in a similar position to yourself – presenting opportunities to develop friendships that last beyond the length of the programme and enable you to build up support networks.

#### What's covered?

Confidence building courses are tailored to the needs of each group of attendees – so every course may offer something slightly different; however the core elements of the course are:

- Getting out and making the most of your leisure time
- Coping strategies designed

- to address the emotional aspect of being visually impaired
- Practical solutions to overcome challenges to everyday living
- Using technology
- Looking after your eyes and skills for making the most of your vision
- Information may also be provided on Employment, Housing and Welfare rights




