Sandra said she is enthusiastic about her new role and proud to be working for an organisation that is passionate about supporting people with sight loss as it embarks on its next phase of development.


# Join us at our annual **Information and Equipment Open Day** on **Thursday 7th September 2017, 10am – 2.30pm**at Reiver House, Morpeth

This year we have a number of Assistive Technology suppliers who will be on hand to offer expert advice, demonstrations and information about a range of Low Vision Aids (LVAs), suitable for blind and partially sighted people. Sight loss organisations including the Macular Society and Blind Veterans UK, along with Action for Hearing Loss will also provide information and advice about services and support.

We are also pleased to confirm we will be holding demonstrations of iPads, tablets, smartphones and eReaders for those with little knowledge or experience using these devices. ### **NCBA Home Visiting Service**

Our Home Visiting Service supports people with a visual impairment to maintain their independence and continue to live in their own home.

Trained volunteers assist with tasks including accessing information, reading correspondence and, where appropriate, helping the person respond.

They can assist with shopping, organising groceries and checking 'use by' dates, helping with a hobby, accompanying the person on a walk or just having a cuppa and a chat.

All of our Home Visitors are trained in sighted guide techniques and how best to support someone with a vision impairment. They are also vetted by the Disclosure and Barring Service.

### Volunteering for NCBA by Sharon Field

Like many people, I first considered volunteering when I retired about 9 years ago. I investigated several avenues but decided on NCBA because it offered the flexibility that I was after and my first impressions of a friendly organisation were very good.

I prefer to help out more on a one-to-one basis rather than in a group situation, so meeting up with people in their own homes has suited me down to the ground. The clients that I have been matched up with have mainly been elderly and housebound who have felt rather isolated and in need of some friendly company to have a chat with.

This has suited me rather well, as those who know me, know I like a good natter! I like the fact that an initial potential 'match' is made by the volunteer co-ordinator and then a meeting is set up with the volunteer, client and co-ordinator to discuss needs and expectations from both

sides before any commitment is made.

My first main client, Marjorie, became a really good friend and we enjoyed many a good debate on politics, religion and the state of the world over a nice cup of tea and cake. We talked about our families and I had the pleasure of meeting all her children and grandchildren (and their dogs!) over the years.

I then became involved with Ilse who very handily lived a 5 minute walk away from me, so I was able to visit easily on a weekly basis. Although she suffered from mild dementia and short term memory problems, we still managed to have some nice chats. especially on tennis as we were both tennis fans. She also had some fascinating stories to tell about the war as Ilse was originally from Germany but married an English soldier before settling in England.

She often yearned for a pet cat which was totally impractical for her so a few times in the summer, I took her in her wheelchair up to my house to sit in the garden and she was thrilled that my (fortunately) very friendly cat sat on her lap – she talked about it for weeks afterwards!

Sadly, both Marjorie and Ilse have now passed away but I still think of them when I'm having afternoon tea and cake or when I'm watching the tennis.

I was also involved with Audrey who I visited at home for a chat, plus I used to take her in a wheelchair to the bank and shops and for strolls around the park before she moved away to be near her son.

At the moment, I take a lovely lady Joyce shopping to Asda most Wednesdays and we manage to have a bit of as natter on the way. She is always very appreciative of the help that she receives but I keep trying to tell her that I

enjoy doing it and it benefits me too by getting me out of the house.

I was also recently put in touch with Jackie who is the same age as me and we instantly hit it off, so I feel that NCBA has found me a new friend! We have definitely become 'ladies who lunch'! We've had a few outings, combining walking, shopping and eating plus she very kindly invited me to her birthday party AND cooked me a meal on Boxing Day. I have also taken her to my bowls club and despite being a newcomer and partially sighted, managed to play as well as the rest of us. When she is feeling a bit stronger, I hope that she might join my walking group for some local short walks.

If anyone is thinking about volunteering with NCBA, then I say "give it a go". I have met some wonderful people and it has enriched my life immensely plus it is entirely up to you how much time and energy that you want to commit to.

#### **Tech Volunteer of the Year Awards 2017**

NCBA volunteer **Christine Dodds** is on the shortlist for the 'Tech Volunteer of the Year' award as part of AbilityNet's Tech4Good Awards!

Christine is very passionate about how access technology can improve a blind or partially sighted person's quality of life. After attending one of RNIB's Online Today sessions at Northumberland County Blind Association (NCBA), Christine was very keen to get involved in supporting people with their devices.

Christine now facilitates a monthly technology peer support drop-in service at NCBA delivering one to one advice and training in the use of smartphones, tablets including iPads and eBook readers.

Trevor Watson, Information and Voluntary Services Manager said: "Christine has proved to be an invaluable volunteer,

someone who is reliable, enthusiastic and willing to impart her knowledge and skills to others".

The Tech4Good Awards (www.tech4goodawards.co m) are organised by AbilityNet. They recognise organisations and individuals who use digital technology to improve the lives of others. The awards normally receive more than 200 nominations so it's an amazing achievement to be a finalist!

Christine said: "I enjoy using technology; I was a nurse for 26 years so just like helping people. I feel it's important to keep abreast of technology and how it works."

Winners will be announced at a glittering ceremony hosted by BT on Tuesday 11 July at BT Centre, London.

#### Northumberland Low Vision Action Group – a history

The inaugural meeting took place in February 2009 at the AGE Concern premises in Ashington. A number of visually impaired service users were present.

It was decided that in order to be taken seriously we should have a formal structure with a Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer. Wansbeck Community Volunteer Service provided training and helped us put together a Constitution. By the time of the next meeting in April 2009, all the roles were filled, the training completed and we were ready for business.

Our priorities at this time were to persuade Northumberland County Council (NCC) to review service provision for Visually Impaired People (VIP), to investigate the delay in CVI referrals from the Eye Dept. at the RVI, accessibility issues and widening the membership of the group.

Members are notified in advance of the meetings and it is interesting to note that in 2009, 25 VIPs opted for large print and 10 by email. This has now completely reversed and one member gets his information by audio CD.

# Professional contacts and other user groups

Over the years we have built up a register of individuals, groups and organisations that have interests and objectives that overlap with the NAG group. These include Blind Veterans UK, ADAPT, Local Macular Groups (Hexham and Berwick), Morpeth Area Partially Sighted Group (MAPS), North East Accessible Transport (NEAT), Henshaws, Newcastle Society for Blind (NSBP), the Northumberland Disability and Deaf Network (NDDN) and Northumberland County Blind Association (NCBA).

Some of our members are involved with other groups such as GP organised Patient Participation Groups, IAG groups set up by the Police, Healthwatch, and Health Boards etc.

All our meetings are attended by the RNIB regional campaigns officer - Francesca DiGiorgio, the engagement officer from Guide Dogs - Linda Oliver and a representative from BID Northumberland (who provide the rehabilitation service for Northumberland).

# Collaboration and networking

When trying to effect change it is vital to make contact with the decision makers. This is why we have gone out of our way to contact and cultivate Town Councillors, County Councillors, Local MPs, local businesses. Chambers of Trade, Local Government Officers - particularly those involved with transport, highways, health and social care. We have persuaded many of them (including your local MP) to undertake blindfold walks which they found enlightening.

We recently succeeded in having the incorrect tactile paving replaced at Morpeth Sanderson Arcade. Martin King (Highways Manager NCC) and Ruth Bendell (NCC) have met with us on numerous occasions in our long running campaign

over pavement obstructions. Although we campaigned for a complete ban we had to compromise and guidance has now been issued for the whole County on the size and positions of A Boards on pavements.

We also met with Ian Lindley (ex Stobhill ward councillor) Richard McKenzie (NCC Planning Dept), Alison Bayard (Town Councillor) over a proposed shared pavement project. This was successfully rejected.

#### The Future

Our success goes on and on but we need like-minded people to join us in our campaigning. Unless we make our voice heard things will not improve for one of the most vulnerable groups in the area. The RNIB Communiclock radio controlled talking calendar clock will announce the time, date and day at the touch of one large button. Cube shaped and without the traditional clock face, the simple design makes this clock easy for everyone to use.





The **Talking Button clock** has a high quality loud English voice which tells the time and date at the press of a button. It has a compact design that sits flat and secure when in use.


