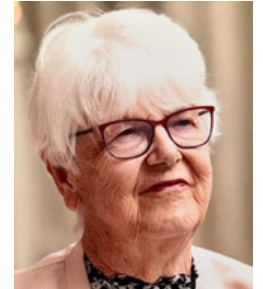

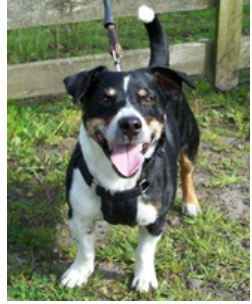
Volunteering Spotlight



Our team of incredible volunteers are at the centre of the work we do. Their dedication, passion and generosity helps drive our services. One of our amazing volunteers is **David Skuse**, who has volunteered with us since 2023.

Why did you decide to volunteer?

After my beloved dog Thai died, I found myself at a loose end. Walks without him were no longer appealing and were over much more quickly in the absence of his time-consuming sniffing and investigating. I was walking past Vision Northumberland during a solo walk when I saw a poster asking for volunteers - so, I volunteered!



What is your current role at Vision Northumberland?

I am an "Admin. Assistant".

Tell us a little about what your volunteering role involves.

I volunteer when the office needs help dealing with labour-intensive tasks such as postal distributions; prepping envelopes and inserts. This takes a long time so my labours free up the staff members to concentrate on other jobs. I also carry out research and have started contributing to and editing the newsletter.

What do you get out of volunteering in this role?

Mostly it's the satisfaction of knowing I am contributing to the valuable work of the charity. Also, meeting with the friendly members of staff.

February is Retinitis Pigmentosa Awareness Month

What is Retinitis Pigmentosa?

Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP) is part of a group of rare eye diseases called inherited retinal dystrophies which cause the cells in the retina to break down slowly over time resulting in vision loss.

What causes Retinitis Pigmentosa?

RP is a hereditary condition (passed down from parents to children) caused by a mutation in one of the genes involved in maintaining the health of the retina. Although uncommon, RP can sometimes be linked to other conditions e.g. Usher syndrome, medicines, infections or an eye injury.

What are the symptoms?

Usually starting in childhood, the first symptom is commonly the loss of sight in the dark or adjusting to dim light (night blindness). As RP progresses, peripheral vision will worsen, leading to tunnel vision. Over time, most people with RP lose their peripheral vision and central vision completely. Other symptoms of RP include loss of colour vision, sensitivity to bright lights, Photopsia (spontaneously occurring flashes/blinking/swirling/shimmering lights), slow adjustments from dark to light and light to dark environments and blurring of vision.

What treatments are available?

There is no cure for RP but there are solutions to help with the condition - low vision aids and portable lighting, mobility and orientation training, Vitamin A supplements, fish oils and lutein supplements.

Accessibility at elections in Northumberland



It is important that electors in Northumberland who are partially sighted or blind are made aware of what is available to them when voting in elections.

Every presiding officer is given in their ballot box a magnifier, a tactile voting device which is attached to a ballot paper to allow blind or partially sighted voters to mark their ballot paper with or without assistance and large print ballot papers.

Any electors who are partially sighted or blind, can inform the elections team at Northumberland County Council what they specifically require so we can make sure where they are voting has the support that best suits them.

Tinnitus Awareness Week (03.02.25 - 10.03.25)

Tinnitus is a condition where people hear noises in their heads or ears even when there are no external or physical noises present. These noises can be ringing, buzzing, roaring, clicking, hissing or humming.

Most cases of tinnitus are linked to hearing loss caused by damage to the inner ear through normal ageing or exposure to loud noise. Less commonly, it can be linked to hearing loss caused by a blockage or ear condition that affects the outer or middle ear; stopping sound waves passing into the inner ear.

Tinnitus can affect people in different ways; some aren't bothered by it and others only mildly. Severe cases can have a social and psychological impact such as difficulty in concentrating, hearing and sleeping. Anxiety and depression are quite common for tinnitus sufferers.
